#### OVERVIEW:

Policy 9090 was reviewed under the guidelines for policy development and adoption. A committee of stakeholders, chaired by Katrina Burton, Executive Director of Business and Finance and Carol Hahn, Principal, West Friendship Elementary, was convened to make recommendations for revisions to the policy. The committee was charged with the following tasks:

- Review all parts of the policy to update legal references as needed and to ensure compliance with legal and regulatory mandates, in particular the Annotated Code of Maryland, Education Article §5-112.
- Review the policy for consistency with the other school system policies, with particular attention to those developed or revised since the last revision of this policy.
- Make recommendations in accordance with current best practices.
- Revise and recommend language as needed to address policy standards outlined in Policy 2020 Policy Development and Adoption.
- Utilize relevant data sources to inform the effectiveness of the policy, if applicable.
- Note any implications or follow-up work that may be necessary as a result of the committee's recommendations.

Attached are highlights of the revisions, a list of committee members, and the proposed policy and implementation procedures. The markup copy includes original language from the current policy. The committee's recommendation was submitted to the Superintendent's Cabinet on February 25, 2013. A public hearing will be held on April 11, 2013.

#### **RECOMMENDATION**/FUTURE DIRECTION:

Following a public hearing on April 11, 2013, the Board will take action to adopt revised Policy 9090 on May 9, 2013. The revised policy will become effective July 1, 2013.

# Policy 9090 Wellness Through Nutrition and Physical Activity Highlights of Initial Proposal

# Policy

- Adds staff wellness and coordinated school health model to the policy statement.
- Adds physical education to the purpose statement and changes the name of the law to the Healthy Hunger-Free Kids Act of 2010.
- Adds definitions for Coordinated School Health, Concessions, Healthy Eating Behavior, Healthy and Nutrient-Dense Foods; Howard County School Health Council; deletes Foods of minimal nutritional value and Physical Activity.
- Prohibits withholding recess as a punishment, except in matters involving student safety, and prohibits the use of physical activity as a punishment.
- Requires breakfast programs in all schools.
- Requires establishment of HCPSS Nutritional Guidelines to provide guidance on all foods and beverages sold or provided to students outside of the Food and Nutrition Service, including via concessions, celebrations, and vending machines.
- Encourages clubs and organizations to consider fundraisers that offer healthier options or that do not involve foods or beverages.
- Adds Staff Health and Wellness section.
- Adds responsibilities for the Superintendent, school principals, the Howard County School Health Council, and the HCPSS.
- Adds HCPSS policies and HCPSS Student Code of Conduct to the resources.
- Establishes new HCPSS responsibilities to oversee implementation of and compliance with the policy.
- Requires each school principal to establish a School Wellness Team and designate a School Wellness Champion.

# Implementation Procedures

- Adds an introductory statement to the Implementation Procedures.
- Adds specificity regarding nutrition education.
- Updates language in the section on physical education and physical activity.
- Updates physical education requirements to align with COMAR and reflect the current master schedule.
- Adds the following sections: "Facilities and Equipment," "District-Level Implementation,"
   "School-Level Implementation," and "Staff Health and Wellness."
- Clarifies restrictions on food used as a reward for students.
- Adds the utilization of the cafeteria as a learning environment to reinforce nutrition education.
- Adds specificity regarding school breakfast programs.
- Encourages family and community involvement through the Howard County School Health Council, the school wellness teams, boosters, PTACHC, and receipt of educational resources.

# POLICY 9090 WELLNESS THROUGH NUTRITION AND PHYSICAL ACTIVITY

**BOARD OF EDUCATION** 

Effective: July 1, 2013

# I. Policy Statement

The Board of Education of Howard County recognizes the connection between health and wellness and student achievement and that students need nourishing foods and physical activity in order to grow, learn, and thrive. The Board recognizes its responsibility to provide a safe and healthy learning environment for all students. The Board recognizes that staff wellness is also an integral part of a healthy school environment and believes that promoting staff wellness fosters improved health status, improved morale, greater commitment to the health of students, and positive role modeling opportunities.

The Board further acknowledges the necessity for the Howard County Public School System (HCPSS) to ensure a coordinated approach to school health. The Board acknowledges the necessity to ensure that the school environment promotes and protects students' ability to learn by providing nutrition education, physical activity, and a variety of healthy food and beverage choices. The Board believes schools have a responsibility to help students develop the skills, knowledge, and attitudes necessary to adopt and maintain a healthy lifestyle.

# II. Purpose

The purpose of this policy is to provide direction to HCPSS staff regarding staff and student wellness through nutrition education, physical education, physical activity, and the selection of nourishing foods and beverages and to fulfill the requirements of the Healthy Hunger-Free Kids Act of 2010.

#### III. Definitions

Within the context of this policy, the following definitions apply:

- A. Comprehensive School Health Education A sequential curriculum that addresses the physical, emotional, and social dimensions of health; develops knowledge, attitudes, and skills regarding health; and is tailored to the developmental level of children.
- B. Concessions Foods sold on school property at events such as sports where members of the public make up a substantial portion of the customers.
- C. Coordinated School Health A systematic approach to improving the health and wellbeing of all students so they can fully participate and be successful in school.
   Coordinated school health typically integrates health promotion efforts across eight

- interrelated components that already exist to some extent in most schools. These components include health education, physical education, health services, nutrition services, counseling, psychological and social services, healthy and safe school environments, staff wellness, and family and community involvement.
- D. Curriculum The prescribed elements of programs and courses which state clearly and specifically what students are expected to know and be able to do, how well they will be able to do it, how they will meet the learning objectives, and by what means they will be assessed.
- E. Extracurricular Activities Activities available to students beyond the regular school day which are voluntary and are not required for satisfactory completion of a particular class.
- F. Healthy Eating Behavior The federal recommendations for meals, such as making one's plate half fruits and vegetables, eliminating sugary drinks, and limiting empty calories.
- G. Healthy and Nutrient-Dense Foods Foods that provide substantial amounts of vitamins and minerals while limiting the amount of sugar, fat, salt, and calories per serving such as fruits, vegetables, whole grains, and low-fat dairy products.
- H. Howard County School Health Council (HCSHC) An advisory group, which identifies needs, reviews practices, programs and policies, and generally provides advice to the HCPSS and the Howard County Health Department (HCHD) on aspects of child health as defined by the coordinated school health approach.
- I. Interscholastic Athletics Approved athletic competition between or among two or more high schools.
- J. Intramural Program An extracurricular activity program within a school that provides students an opportunity to participate in activities that are an extension of the physical education program.
- K. Nutrition Education Educational strategies designed to facilitate voluntary adoption of food choices and other food- and nutrition-related behaviors conducive to health and well-being.
- L. Physical Education A sequential curriculum that teaches skills, knowledge, and attitudes which are needed to establish and lead a physically active life.
- M. Recess Regularly scheduled periods within the school day for unstructured physical activity and play.

#### IV. Standards

#### A. Health and Nutrition Education

Health and nutrition education provides students with opportunities to acquire the knowledge, attitudes, and skills necessary for making health-promoting decisions, achieving health literacy, adopting health-enhancing behaviors, and promoting the health of others.

- 1. The HCPSS will implement a curriculum in nutrition education as part of the instructional program in comprehensive health education, in accordance with COMAR13A.04.18.
- 2. Nutrition education will be included in the health education curriculum each year in prekindergarten—grade 8, and in the high school health education curriculum that enables students to meet graduation requirements and to select a health education elective.
- 3. The health education curriculum will be aligned with the National Health Education Standards and the Maryland State Health Education Curriculum.
- 4. Nutrition education will be integrated in appropriate curricular areas.

#### B. Physical Education

Physical education provides instructional opportunities for students to gain the necessary skills and knowledge for lifelong participation in physical activity.

- The HCPSS will implement a curriculum in physical education in accordance with Maryland State Physical Education Curriculum, COMAR 13A.04.13, and the Fitness and Equity Act 2008.
- 2. Physical education will be provided each year for all students in prekindergartengrade 8.
- 3. In grades 9–12, program offerings will be provided to enable students to meet graduation requirements and to select physical education electives.
- 4. Under the Maryland State Board of Education regulations, the physical education curriculum will be modified if a student's physical limitation or medical condition warrants such accommodation rather than exemption from physical education.

#### C. Physical Activity

Physical activity opportunities will be offered throughout the school day to support student learning and achievement.

- 1. Recess will be a daily component of all elementary school students' physical, social, and academic development.
- 2. Recess will provide an opportunity for students to take a break from classwork, engage in play with their peers, and participate in unstructured activities.
- 3. Staff members will not deny participation in recess or other physical activity opportunities as a form of discipline or punishment unless the safety of students is in question.
- 4. Physical activity will not be used as a punishment (e.g. running laps or doing pushups).
- 5. All staff will be provided professional development on physical activity breaks and encouraged to incorporate physical activity into classroom instruction.
- 6. All middle school students will have the opportunity to participate in intramural sports and other physical activities which will be provided by each middle school.
- 7. Each high school will provide an interscholastic athletic program in accordance with Policy 9080 Interscholastic Athletic Program and Policy 9070 Academic Eligibility for Extracurricular Activities.
- 8. The HCPSS will promote using school facilities outside of school hours for physical activity programs offered by community-based organizations. Priority for space within school buildings will be given to school-sponsored activities and community-based activities in accordance with Policy 10020 Use of School Facilities.

# D. Nutrition Services; Foods and Beverages

The HCPSS will provide access to a variety of nutritious and appealing meals that accommodate the health and nutrition needs of all students. The following standards apply to all foods and beverages made available to students in schools, on HCPSS property, or through school-sponsored events.

#### 1. General

- a. All foods must meet safety guidelines (as outlined in Implementation Procedures Section V.A.).
- b. Foods and beverages should not be consumed as part of the instructional program except as defined in the curriculum for Family and Consumer Science, Academic Life Skills (ALS), and when indicated in a student's Individualized Educational Program (IEP) or 504 Plan.

- c. Foods and beverages will not be offered as a reward or withheld as punishment, except when indicated in a student's IEP or 504 Plan.
- d. All students and employees will have free access to clean and safe drinking water throughout the school day and at after-school activities. The HCPSS promotes the consumption of water as an essential element that plays a role in overall health and wellness.
- e. The Superintendent/Designee will establish HCPSS Nutritional Guidelines to implement best practice standards such as the Institute of Medicine Standards for Competitive Foods and the Healthier US Schools Challenge.

#### 2. School Meals

- a. The HCPSS will provide the opportunity for all students to begin the school day with a nutritious breakfast.
- b. The HCPSS School Food and Nutrition Service Office will make meal pattern lunches available to students each day that school is in session (including early dismissal days), as well as a la carte and snack/dessert items.
- c. School nutrition programs reflect the U.S. Dietary Guidelines for Americans, the Healthier US Schools Challenge Standards, and the Institute of Medicine Standards.

#### 3. Other Foods and Beverages

- a. A la carte and snack/dessert items sold by the Food and Nutrition Service will meet the guidelines from Maryland State Department of Education (MSDE) and the Institute of Medicine Standards for Competitive Foods.
- b. School celebrations involving food and beverages may be permitted by the principal no more than once per month after the end of the last lunch period and will comply with HCPSS Nutritional Guidelines. Schools are encouraged to develop alternatives to the use of food and beverages for celebrations.
- c. Concessions will follow HCPSS Nutritional Guidelines and will include some healthier items.
- d. All foods and beverages sold in vending machines that are accessible to students will meet the HCPSS Nutritional Guidelines.
- e. All other food and beverages sold or provided free of charge on school system property where the primary customers or recipients are students will comply with the HCPSS Nutritional Guidelines.

- f. Clubs and organizations authorized to raise money on school property using order forms for food and beverages to be consumed off of school property are encouraged to offer healthier options. Clubs and organizations are also encouraged to consider fundraisers that do not involve food and beverages.
- g. No candy, soda, or artificially flavored drinks that contain no pure juices will be sold or given without charge to students during the school day.

#### E. Staff Health and Wellness

- 1. The HCPSS will provide opportunities for staff members to improve their health status through the HCPSS Commit To Be Fit Employee Wellness Program which includes activities such as health assessments, health education, and health-related fitness activities.
- 2. The HCPSS Commit To Be Fit Employee Wellness Program will be overseen by the Employee Wellness Council consisting of representatives from all employee groups.
- 3. All staff members are encouraged to model healthful eating and physical activity.

# V. Responsibilities

- A. The Superintendent/Designee will provide an annual report on the implementation of the policy.
- B. The Superintendent/Designee will ensure that any subsequent changes to this policy are reported to the MSDE.
- C. The Superintendent/Designee will develop, implement and monitor a process for the development and review of the HCPSS's curriculum and assessment programs that complies with state and local requirements and provides sufficient academic rigor for students.
- D. The Superintendent/Designee will provide for annual notification of this policy and procedures to staff, students, parents, and the community.
- E. The Superintendent/Designee will ensure that opportunities for physical activity are provided during the school day in accordance with this policy.
- F. The Superintendent/Designee will oversee school implementation and compliance with this policy, including:
  - 1. Provide technical assistance and support to assist schools with implementation of the policy and improve programming functions.

- 2. Ensure schools are offered support services through various departments including the Food and Nutrition Service, Physical Education, and Health and Physical Education, to ensure the full implementation of this policy.
- 3. Establish a process for identifying and distributing resources made available by qualified agencies and community organizations for the purpose of collaborating with schools and community organizations such as Boosters and the PTA Council of Howard County (PTACHC) to enhance implementation of this policy.
- 4. Establish a process to gather regular reporting and feedback from individual schools, community partners, students, and parents on the implementation of the policy.
- 5. Conduct periodic evaluations and report on systemwide and individual schools' compliance with the policy.
- 6. Conduct periodic, systemwide review and assessment of this policy and other related Board policies on their effectiveness and, based on this assessment, propose policy revisions.
- G. Each school principal will ensure that a School Wellness Team is formed annually to spearhead health and wellness initiatives at the school that are in compliance with this policy. The principal will establish a system to annually identify School Wellness Team members which may include parents/guardians, teachers of physical education, classroom teachers, school nurses/assistants, students, school administrators, and community health and wellness partners.
- H. Each school principal will annually designate a school employee to serve as the School Wellness Champion who will:
  - 1. Lead and coordinate their school's efforts to increase healthy eating and physical activity for students.
  - 2. Serve as the liaison for their respective school's policy implementation and reporting.
  - 3. Establish and lead a School Wellness Team that develops goals, strategies, and initiatives for student health, wellness, and physical activity during the school year.
- I. Each school principal will provide annual updates to the Superintendent/Designee regarding the school's health and wellness initiatives and the school's implementation of this policy.
- J. The Howard County School Health Council, which serves in an advisory capacity, will provide feedback annually to the Board.

- K. The HCPSS will report the number of schools that meet the HealthierUS Schools Challenge annually. Additional annual school progress measures may be developed to track progress on implementation of Coordinated School Health.
- L. The Food and Nutrition Service Office and school principals will ensure that all foods and beverages made available to students in schools or through school-sponsored events, from 12:01 a.m. until the end of the school day, are in compliance with this policy.
- M. Professional development on the implementation of this policy will be provided as part of the regular professional development program for staff.

# VI. Delegation of Authority

The Superintendent is authorized to develop procedures for the implementation of this policy.

# WELLNESS THROUGH NUTRITION AND PHYSICAL ACTIVITY

Effective: July 1, 2013

## I. Implementation Procedures Statement

Coordinated school health is a systematic approach to improving students' health and well-being so they can participate and succeed in school. Developing habits for healthy eating and regular physical activity can have a lifelong positive impact on students' health. A coordinated approach calls for the Board of Education, Superintendent, and staff to work together, engage families and communities, and commit to consistent modeling of healthy behaviors. Attention to the physical, social, emotional, and mental health of our student body involves the entire community, including students, parents, counselors, teachers, health professionals, community organizations, administrators, and more.

In order to successfully implement this policy, the Howard County Public School System (HCPSS) is committed to engaging and educating the community, staff, and students of the importance of health and well-being to academic achievement.

## II. Health and Nutrition Education

- A. Students in prekindergarten–grade 12 will receive health education in multiple formats with opportunities to acquire the knowledge, attitudes, and skills necessary for making health-promoting decisions, achieving health literacy, adopting health-enhancing behaviors, and promoting healthy lifestyles.
- B. The health education curriculum will include nutrition education for students in prekindergarten—grade 8 and in a required high school health education course. Nutrition education will provide students with developmentally appropriate, culturally relevant, participatory activities to develop student understanding of the food system and to experience a variety of tastes.
  - 1. At the elementary level, the health education curriculum will be taught by the classroom teacher as one of the five content areas in the elementary curricular program.
  - 2. At the middle school level, the health education curriculum will be taught every other day for one semester in grades 6, 7, and 8.

- 3. At the high school level, the health education curriculum will be taught for one semester (18 weeks) to meet high school graduation requirements.
- 4. Nutrition education will develop student understanding of the food system and aide students in experiencing different tastes through programs such as: school gardens, visiting local farms, Days of Taste or similar programs, Department of Agriculture Robinson Nature Center, community college curriculum, and others.
- 5. The cafeteria will be utilized as a learning environment to reinforce nutrition education.
- C. Nutrition education will be included in the essential objectives in appropriate elective courses such as Family and Consumer Sciences, Health Education, and Physical Education.
- D. Staff will be encouraged to teach nutrition education through content integration in curricular areas such as science, mathematics, and social studies. HCPSS will provide resources to all teachers on how to integrate nutrition education into the curriculum.
- E. Staff will collaborate with other programs and offices such as the Gifted and Talented Program, and Student Services to deliver nutrition education through classroom, small group, and individual activities.
- F. Nutrition information and resources will be provided to families through newsletters, publications, health fairs, the HCPSS website, and other means.

## III. Physical Education and Physical Activity

- A. Physical Education
  - 1. Students at all grade levels will have access to the physical education curriculum.
  - 2. The HCPSS will implement a physical education curriculum for students in prekindergarten–grade 8.
    - a. The elementary school master schedule will reflect 90 minutes of physical education per week.
    - b. The middle school master schedule will reflect 50 minutes of physical education every other day.
  - 3. In grades 9–12, students will receive one-half credit of physical education instruction, the Lifetime Fitness course, to meet graduation requirements. In addition, HCPSS will offer a variety of physical education electives.

4. Physical education staff will receive professional development on an ongoing basis.

# B. Physical Activity

With the goal of limiting extended periods of inactivity and to promote learning, staff will receive resources, guidance, and professional development on ways to incorporate physical activity within the school day.

#### 1. Recess

- a. Each elementary school will provide daily recess, preferably outdoors, during which schools should encourage moderate to vigorous physical activity through the provision of adequate space and equipment. Exceptions may be made by the principal for circumstances such as shortened days, special events, and altered schedules.
- b. Recess must be adequately and appropriately staffed and supervised.
- c. At the middle school level, time permitting, schools will provide students with an opportunity for supervised physical activity.
- d. The Superintendent/Designee will establish recess guidelines.

#### 2. Other Physical Activity During School

- a. All staff will be encouraged to incorporate physical activity breaks whenever possible into classroom instruction.
- b. HCPSS will provide training that encourages physical activity to aid teachers in implementing physical activity breaks.
- c. School Wellness Teams will proactively communicate with parents/guardians about the importance of physical activity.

## 3. Extracurricular and Intramural Programs

- a. Each middle school will provide an intramural program that offers students an opportunity to participate in sports, games, and/or dance activities that focus on cardiovascular fitness, muscular strength, endurance and flexibility.
- b. Each high school will provide a comprehensive interscholastic athletic program under Policy 9080 Interscholastic Athletic Program.

# IV. Facilities and Equipment

- A. When schools are built or renovated, the design of gymnasium facilities will consider the Physical Education Facilities Guidelines issued by the Maryland State Department of Education (MSDE).
- B. The HCPSS will review its permitting and actual space usage each year to ensure maximum use of school facilities during and after school in accordance with Policy 10020 Use of School Facilities.

# V. Nutrition Services; Foods and Beverages

These procedures apply to all foods and beverages made available to students in schools, on HCPSS property, or through school-sponsored events, including but not limited to:

- School Meals Program
- A la carte and snack/dessert items
- Vending machines
- Classroom lessons
- Beverage contracts
- Fundraisers
- Concession stands
- School stores
- Food brought from home for classes or groups of students
- Student rewards
- School parties/ celebrations/ dances/ athletic events/ concerts/ picnics/ field days/ fairs/festivals, etc.
- Resource speakers

Foods and beverages covered by this policy will comply with the current United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) Dietary Guidelines for Americans and federal, state, and local laws, including safety and sanitation standards set by the Health Department Hazard Analysis and Critical Control Point (HACCP) plans and guidelines.

- A. Safety and Security Issues Related to Foods and Beverages
  - Howard County Health Department Regulations (referenced via the Howard County Code) require that food served to the public must be prepared in a licensed facility. The license for the HCPSS School Food and Nutrition Service is not transferable to outside caterers or groups applying for use of the facilities.
  - 2. For the safety and security of the food and facility, access to the food service facilities is limited to HCPSS Food and Nutrition Service staff.

- 3. The preparation of foods and beverages during the school day by any group or organization other than the HCPSS School Food and Nutrition Service office is prohibited, except that students may prepare foods and beverages in accordance with the provisions of section V.A.4. of these procedures.
- 4. Classroom activities that involve cooking are not permitted, except as defined in the curriculum for Family and Consumer Science, Academic Life Skills (ALS), and when indicated in a student's IEP, and are limited to non-hazardous foods. Examples of potentially hazardous foods that are excluded from classroom activities include foods made with poultry, meats, fish, rice, eggs, seafood, mayonnaise, dairy products, casseroles, and sauces containing meat.
- 5. Schools will provide students the opportunity to wash their hands before and after eating meals or snacks.
- 6. Principals and teachers will request that parents and other individuals avoid bringing foods to school that might cause a food allergic student to have an allergic reaction. (See the HCPSS Guidelines for Management of Students with Severe Food Allergies.)
- 7. Except as provided in sections V.A.4. and V.E.2., no foods or beverages are to be sold or given without charge to any students in a school from 12:01 a.m. until after the end of the last lunch period except through the School Food and Nutrition Service.

#### B. Student Rewards

Foods and beverages will not be given as a reward to students or withheld as a punishment, except as provided in a student's Individualized Educational Program (IEP) or 504 Plan. Coupons for food items that are to be consumed off school campus may be given. Outside partners providing coupons are encouraged to offer healthier, nutrient-dense choices (i.e. those that include fruits and vegetables, whole grains, and/or low-fat dairy and foods that limit the sodium, fat, sugar and calories per serving). Informational resources on HCPSS' nutritional guidelines will be provided to external partners.

## C. School Meals Program

- 1. The School Food and Nutrition Service will provide approved school lunches each day that school is in session.
- 2. School meals will meet all nutrition standards established by the USDA.
- 3. Daily food choices offered to students will include multiple entrees, fresh unlimited salad bars, trays of fruits and vegetables, whole grain breads and rolls, and flavored and unflavored fat-free or 1% milk. Although students are

free to choose the foods they want for lunch, at least one of their choices will be a fruit or vegetable.

- 4. Main course food items offered as alternatives to or in addition to the reimbursable meal will be offered in reasonable portion sizes that are consistent with the USDA for Child Nutrition Programs.
- 5. The School Breakfast Program will be available to all students every weekday morning that school is in session. Exceptions may be made by the school principal on delayed opening days. No advance registration is necessary, students can attend every day or only occasionally, and the meals will be based on the nutrition recommendations set forth in the USDA Dietary Guidelines. The School Breakfast Program models include but are not limited to: Traditional Breakfast, Breakfast in the Classroom, Grab and Go Breakfast, and/or Breakfast after First Period.
- Morning bus routes will be scheduled to allow students to arrive in time for breakfast.
- 7. The HCPSS will proactively promote the school breakfast program to students and parents to encourage greater participation.
- 8. Students are prohibited from leaving the school campus for lunch.
- 9. Students will be given adequate time to eat. Lunch periods may be compressed and the breakfast program may be skipped on shortened days.
- 10. The School Food and Nutrition Service will incorporate produce from local farms as much as possible and when in season and available.
- 11. Schools will make nutritional information available to students to make informed decisions. Healthier choices, such as salads and fruit, will be prominently displayed in cafeterias and competitively priced.
- 12. Students will be provided a pleasant environment in which to eat school meals. Appropriate supervision will be provided in the cafeteria and rules for safe behavior will be consistently enforced.
- 13. Professional development in the area of food and nutrition will be provided annually for food service managers, staff, and school administrators.
- 14. The school system will provide periodic food promotions at each school level to encourage taste testing of healthy new foods being introduced on the menu.

15. Students and families will have the opportunity to provide input on local, cultural and ethnic favorites, and the input will be considered in development of the school meals programs.

# D. Beverages

- 1. All beverages given or sold to students on school campus, including beverages sold in vending machines that are accessible to students, must meet the HCPSS Nutritional Guidelines.
- 2. Students will have access to drinking water that is safe and clean throughout the school day, and free of charge in the school cafeteria, classrooms, hallways, gymnasiums, play yards, and athletic fields.
- The Superintendent/Designee will set and maintain hygiene standards for drinking fountains, water coolers, hydration stations, water jets, and other methods of delivering drinking water.
- 4. Students may purchase unflavored, unfortified, non-carbonated water from vending machines operated by the Food and Nutrition Service during the school day.

# E. Other Foods and Beverages

- 1. A la carte and snack/dessert items sold by the Food and Nutrition Service will meet the guidelines from MSDE and the Institute of Medicine Standards for Competitive Foods.
- 2. A principal may permit food and/or beverages in conjunction with a special celebration no more than once per month after the end of the last lunch period. Such events may not replace the food service provided that day by the Food and Nutrition Service. The food and beverages served will be prepared commercially in licensed facilities and will comply with HCPSS Nutritional Guidelines established by the Superintendent/Designee. Schools are encouraged to develop alternatives to the use of food for celebrations.
- 3. Foods and beverages sold via concessions must follow HCPSS Nutritional Guidelines and must include some healthier items (such as fruits and vegetables, whole grains, low-fat dairy and items that limit salt, sugar and saturated fat). The Superintendent/Designee will provide user-friendly guidelines (such as sample menus) and provide educational resources to assist groups in developing healthier menu options.
- 4. All foods and beverages sold in vending machines that are accessible to students will meet the HCPSS Nutritional Guidelines.

- 5. All other food and beverages sold or provided free of charge on school system property where the primary customers or recipients are students will comply with the HCPSS Nutritional Guidelines. This includes foods/snacks sold or provided during field days, fairs, after school events, bake sales, spaghetti dinners, etc. Groups sponsoring these activities will consult with the School Food and Nutrition Service for guidance when planning such events.
- 6. Food fundraisers that involve consumption of food off school campus are encouraged to offer healthier food options (such as fruits and vegetables, whole grains, low-fat dairy and items that limit salt, sugar and saturated fat). The Superintendent/Designee will provide educational resources to organizations and clubs to encourage expansion of healthier food fundraisers or fundraisers that do not involve food.
- 7. Partnerships with external businesses that provide coupons or promotions for consumption of food off school campus are encouraged to offer healthier food options (such as fruits and vegetables, whole grains, low-fat dairy and items that limit salt, sugar and saturated fat). The Superintendent/Designee will proactively communicate with potential and current partners to promote healthier options and non-food rewards for students.
- 8. The following items will not be sold or given without charge to students during the school day:
  - a. Soda with sugar or artificially flavored drinks that contain no pure juices.
  - b. Water ices.
  - c. Chewing gum.
  - d. Candy.
- F. Vending Machines Accessible After the School Day
  - 1. All vending machines accessible to students, except those operated by the School Food and Nutrition Service, will have and use a timing device to automatically prohibit access to the vending machines from 12:01 a.m. until the end of the school day.
  - 2. Food and beverages sold after the end of the school day through vending machines in schools are permitted only at the middle and high school level.

## VI. District-Level Implementation

The Superintendent/Designee will oversee school implementation and compliance with this policy including:

A. Provide technical assistance and support to assist schools with implementation of the policy and improve programming functions.

- B. Ensure schools are offered support services through various departments including the Food and Nutrition Service, Physical Education, and Health and Physical Education, to ensure the full implementation of this policy.
- C. Establish a process for identifying and distributing resources made available by qualified agencies and community organizations for the purpose of collaborating with schools and community organizations such as Boosters and the PTA Council of Howard County (PTACHC) to enhance implementation of this policy.
- D. Establish a process to gather regular reporting and feedback from individual schools, community partners, students, and parents on the implementation of the policy.
- E. Conduct periodic evaluations and report on systemwide and individual schools' compliance with the policy.
- F. Conduct periodic, systemwide review and assessment of this policy and other related Board policies on their effectiveness and, based on this assessment, propose policy revisions.

# VII. School-Level Implementation

- A. Each school principal will ensure that a School Wellness Team is formed annually to spearhead health and wellness initiatives at the school that are in compliance with this policy. The principal will establish a system to annually identify School Wellness Team members which may include parents/guardians, teachers of physical education, classroom teachers, school nurses/assistants, students, school administrators, and community health and wellness partners.
- B. Each school principal will annually designate a school employee to serve as the School Wellness Champion who will:
  - 1. Lead and coordinate their school's efforts to increase healthy eating and physical activity for students.
  - 2. Serve as the liaison for their respective school's policy implementation and reporting.
  - 3. Establish and lead a School Wellness Team that develops goals, strategies, and initiatives for student health, wellness, and physical activity during the school year.
- C. Each school principal will provide annual updates to the Superintendent/Designee regarding the school's health and wellness initiatives and the school's implementation of this policy.

#### VIII. Staff Health and Wellness

- A. The Employee Wellness Council will review the program philosophy, vision, mission, goals, and objectives of the HCPSS Commit To Be Fit Employee Wellness Program, evaluate the needs of the school system, recommend specific programs, determine needed resources, and establish evaluation outcome measures. In partnership with the Wellness Coordinator, Employee Wellness Council members will act as champions of wellness by promoting participation of all employees in healthy lifestyle activities.
- B. The Employee Wellness Council will support the goal of the HCPSS Commit To Be Fit Employees Wellness Program, which is to provide opportunities, support, and encouragement for employees to seek healthy lifestyle choices that enhance physical, emotional, mental, social, and spiritual well-being.
- C. The Employee Wellness Council members will represent a variety of school district departments. The Employee Wellness Council will also act on behalf of those departments not represented and will seek input from those departments through regular communication. All departments will have an opportunity to have representation on the council as members are rotated off and are replaced biannually.
- D. The Employee Wellness Council will present an annual report to the Board to include information such as program highlights, details of activities conducted, participation data, future plans, measures of results, and return on investment data.

## IX. Family/Community Collaboration

- A. The HCPSS will partner with the Howard County School Health Council (COMAR 13A.05.05) and other agencies to support the implementation of coordinated and comprehensive school health practices.
- B. Parents and members of the community have the opportunity to be involved in implementation of this policy through:
  - 1. Howard County School Health Council: Parents and members of the community may serve on the School Health Council and/or its subcommittee.
  - 2. School Wellness Teams: Parents and community health and wellness partners will be invited to participate in school-level School Wellness Teams.
  - 3. Boosters and PTA Council of Howard County (PTACHC): This office will work with schools and community organizations such as the Boosters and PTACHC.

- C. Parents will receive educational resources and encouragement to help their children implement physical activity plans.
- D. Families will be engaged in school activities that encourage healthy eating, and will have opportunities for input in the menus and other aspects of school nutrition.

# I. Policy Statement

The Board of Education of Howard County recognizes that good the connection between health fosters and wellness and student attendance and education achievement and that students need nourishing foods and physical activity in order to grow, learn, and thrive. The Board of Education recognizes its responsibility to provide a safe and healthy learning environment for all students. The Board recognizes that staff wellness is also an integral part of a healthy school environment and believes that promoting staff wellness fosters improved health status, improved morale, greater commitment to the health of students, and positive role modeling opportunities.

The <u>Board further</u> acknowledges the necessity for the <u>Howard County Public sS</u>chool <u>sSystem</u> (HCPSS) to ensure a coordinated approach to school health. The Board acknowledges the <u>necessity</u> to ensure that the school environment promotes and protects students' <u>health and</u> ability to learn by providing nutrition education, physical activity, and a variety of <u>healthy</u> food and beverage choices. The Board believes schools have a responsibility to help students develop the skills, knowledge, and attitudes necessary to adopt and maintain a healthy lifestyle.

# II. Purpose

The purpose of this policy is to provide direction to the school system for promoting <u>HCPSS</u> staff regarding staff and student wellness through nutrition education, <u>physical education</u>, physical activity, and the selection of nourishing foods and beverages and to fulfill the requirements of <u>Public Law 108-265</u>, <u>Section 204</u>, <u>June 30</u>, <u>2004</u>, <u>Child Nutrition and WIC Reauthorization Act of 2004</u> the <u>Healthy Hunger-Free Kids Act of 2010</u>.

#### III. Definitions

Within the context of this policy, the following definitions apply:

- A. Comprehensive School Health Education A <del>planned</del> sequential curriculum that addresses the physical, emotional, and social dimensions of health; develops <del>health</del> knowledge, attitudes, and skills <u>regarding health</u>; and is tailored to the developmental level of children.
- <u>B.</u> Concessions Foods sold on school property at events such as sports where members of the public make up a substantial portion of the customers.

- C. Coordinated School Health A systematic approach to improving the health and well-being of all students so they can fully participate and be successful in school. Coordinated school health typically integrates health promotion efforts across eight interrelated components that already exist to some extent in most schools. These components include health education, physical education, health services, nutrition services, counseling, psychological and social services, healthy and safe school environments, staff wellness, and family and community involvement.
- <u>BD</u>. Curriculum The prescribed elements of programs and courses which state clearly and specifically what students are expected to know and be able to do, how well they will be able to do it, how they will meet the learning objectives and by what means they will be assessed.
- <u>CE</u>. Extracurricular <u>aA</u>ctivities Activities available to students beyond the regular school day, which are voluntary and <u>are</u> not required for satisfactory completion of a particular class.
- D. Foods of minimal nutritional value—As established by the U.S. Department of Agriculture: (i) In the case of artificially sweetened foods, a food which provides less than five percent of the Reference Daily Intakes (RDI) for each of eight specified nutrients per serving; and (ii) in the case of all other foods, a food which provides less than five percent of the RDI for each of eight specified nutrients per 100 calories and less than five percent of the RDI for each of eight specified nutrients per serving. (7 CFR 210.11(2))
- F. Healthy Eating Behavior The federal recommendations for meals, such as making one's plate half fruits and vegetables, eliminating sugary drinks, and limiting empty calories.
- G. Healthy and Nutrient-Dense Foods Foods that provide substantial amounts of vitamins and minerals while limiting the amount of sugar, fat, salt, and calories per serving such as fruits, vegetables, whole grains, and low-fat dairy products.
- H. Howard County School Health Council (HCSHC) An Advisory group, which identifies needs, reviews practices, programs and policies, and generally provides advice to the HCPSS and the Howard county Health Department (HCHD) on aspects of child health as defined by the coordinated school health approach.
- FI. Interscholastic aAthletics Approved athletic competition between or among two or more high schools.
- E<u>J</u>. Intramural <u>pProgram</u> An extracurricular activity program within a school that provides students an opportunity to participate in activities that are an extension of the physical education program.

- GK. Nutrition eEducation A component of the comprehensive school health education curriculum which teaches knowledge and skills related to nutrition and physical activity to achieve positive changes in dietary and physical activity. Educational strategies designed to facilitate voluntary adoption of food choices and other food- and nutrition-related behaviors conducive to health and well-being.
- H. Physical activity Any bodily movement produced by skeletal muscles that results in an expenditure of energy.
- <u>HL</u>. Physical <u>eE</u>ducation <u>program</u> A <u>planned</u> sequential curriculum that teaches skills, knowledge, and attitudes which are needed to establish and lead a physically active life.
- <u>JM.</u> Recess Regularly scheduled periods within the school day for unstructured physical activity and play.

## IV. Standards

A. Health and Nutrition Education

Health and nutrition education provides students with opportunities to acquire the knowledge, attitudes, and skills necessary for making health-promoting decisions, achieving health literacy, adopting health-enhancing behaviors, and promoting the health of others.

- 1. The school system <u>HCPSS</u> will develop and implement a curriculum in nutrition education as part of the system's instructional program in comprehensive health education, in accordance with <u>COMAR 13A COMAR 13A.04.18.</u>
- 42. Nutrition education will be included in the health education curriculum each year for all students in grades pre-kindergarten through eight prekindergarten—grade 8, and in a the high school health education program in grades nine through twelve designed to enable curriculum that enables students to meet graduation requirements and to select a health education electives.
- 23. Nutrition The health education curriculum will be aligned with the National Health Education Standards and the Maryland Voluntary State Health Education Curriculum.
- 34. Nutrition education will be included integrated in appropriate curricular areas.
- B. Physical Education

Physical education provides instructional opportunities for students to gain the necessary skills and knowledge for lifelong participation in physical activity.

- 1. The school system <u>HCPSS</u> will develop and implement a curriculum in physical education in accordance with <u>Maryland State Physical Education Curriculum</u> COMAR 13A.04.13 and the Fitness and Equity Act 2008.
- 42. A pPhysical education program will be provided each year for all students in prekindergarten through grade eight prekindergarten—grade 8.
- 2. Physical education will be aligned with the Maryland State Physical Education Curriculum and to the greatest extent possible with the guidelines of the National Association for Sport and Physical Education (NASPE) Standards.
- 3. Students with disabilities will be provided equal opportunities to participate in the HCPSS mainstream physical education program.
- 3. In grades nine through twelve 9–12, program offerings will be provided to enable students to meet graduation requirements and to select physical education electives.
- 4. Physical education will be included in appropriate curricular areas.
- 4. Under the Maryland State Board of Education regulations, the physical education curriculum will be modified if a student's physical limitation or medical condition warrants such accommodation rather than exemption from physical education.

# C. Physical Activity

Physical activity opportunities will be offered throughout the school day to support student learning and achievement.

- 1. Each elementary school will provide daily recess, preferably outdoors, during which schools should encourage moderate to vigorous physical activity through the provision of adequate space and equipment. Exceptions may be made by the principal for circumstances such as shortened days, special events, and altered schedules.
- 1. Recess will be a daily component of all elementary school students' physical, social, and academic development.
- 2. Each middle school will provide extracurricular physical activity programs such as clubs and intramurals. Time permitting, schools should provide students with an opportunity for supervised physical activity during their lunch period.
- 2. Recess will provide an opportunity for students to take a break from classwork, engage in play with their peers, and participate in unstructured activities.

- 3. Staff members will not deny participation in recess or other physical activity opportunities as a form of discipline or punishment unless the safety of students is in question.
- 4. Physical activity will not be used as a punishment (e.g. running laps or doing pushups).
- 5. All staff will be provided professional development on physical activity breaks and encouraged to incorporate physical activity into classroom instruction.
- 6. All middle school students will have the opportunity to participate in intramural sports and other physical activities which will be provided by each middle school.
- 37. Each high school will provide an interscholastic athletic program in accordance with Policy 9080 Interscholastic Athletic Program and Policy 9070 Academic Eligibility for Extracurricular Activities.
- 4. All staff are encouraged to incorporate physical activity whenever possible into classroom instruction.
- 8. The HCPSS will promote using school facilities outside of school hours for physical activity programs offered by community-based organizations. Priority for space within school buildings will be given to school sponsored activities and community-based activities in accordance with Policy 10020 Use of School Facilities.
- D. Nutrition Services; Foods and Beverages

The HCPSS will provide access to a variety of nutritious and appealing meals that accommodate the health and nutrition needs of all students. The following standards apply to all foods and beverages made available to students in schools, on HCPSS property, or through school-sponsored events during the school day.

#### 1. General

- a. Schools are encouraged to consider wellness issues and student allergies when planning incentive and promotional activities. All foods must meet safety guidelines (as outlined in Implementation Procedures Section V.A.)
- b. Foods and beverages should not be consumed as an educational tool part of the instructional program except as defined in the curriculum for Family and Consumer Science, Academic Life Skills (ALS), and when indicated in a student's Individualized Educational Program (IEP) or 504 Plan.
- c. Foods and beverages should will not be offered as a reward or withheld as punishment, except when indicated in a student's IEP or 504 Plan.

- d. All students and employees will have free access to clean and safe drinking water throughout the school day and at after-school activities. The HCPSS promotes the consumption of water as an essential element that plays a role in overall health and wellness.
- e. The Superintendent/Designee will establish HCPSS Nutritional Guidelines to implement best practice standards such as the Institute of Medicine Standards for Competitive Foods and the Healthier US Schools Challenge.

#### 2. School Meals

- <u>a.</u> The HCPSS will provide the opportunity for all students to begin the school day with a nutritious breakfast.
- <u>ab</u>. The <u>HCPSS</u> School Food and Nutrition Service <del>Department</del> Office will provide make meal pattern <del>breakfast and</del> lunches <u>available</u> to students each day that school is in session (including early dismissal days), as well as a la carte and snack/dessert items <del>consistent with the Federal and State regulations</del>.
- b. Guidelines for reimbursable school meals shall not be less restrictive than regulations and guidance issued by the Secretary of Agriculture pursuant to subsections (a) and (b) of section 10 of the Child Nutrition Act (42 U.S.C. 1779) and section (9)(f)(1) and 17(a) of the Richard B. Russell National School Lunch Act (42 U.S.C.1758(f)(1), 1776(a), as those regulations and guidance apply to schools.
- c. School nutrition programs reflect the U.S. Dietary Guidelines for Americans, the Healthier US Schools Challenge Standards, and the Institute of Medicine Standards.

#### 3. Competitive Foods Other Foods and Beverages

The school system will establish procedures to ensure that the sale of foods and/or provision of foods free of charge to students on school campuses during the school day beyond those available through the National School Meals Programs meet the intent of this policy.

- <u>A la carte and snack/dessert items sold by the Food and Nutrition Service will</u>
   meet the guidelines from the Maryland State Department of Education
   (MSDE) and the Institute of Medicine Standards for Competitive Foods.
- b. School celebrations involving food and beverages may be permitted by the principal no more than once per month after the end of the last lunch period and will comply with HCPSS Nutritional Guidelines. Schools are encouraged to develop alternatives to the use of food and beverages for celebrations.

- c. Concessions will follow HCPSS Nutritional Guidelines and must will include some healthier items.
- <u>d.</u> All foods and beverages sold in vending machines that are accessible to students will meet the HCPSS Nutritional Guidelines.
- e. All other food and beverages sold or provided free of charge on school system property where the primary customers or recipients are students will comply with the HCPSS Nutritional Guidelines.
- f. Clubs and organizations authorized to raise money on school property using order forms for food and beverages to be consumed off of school property are encouraged to offer healthier options. Clubs and organizations are also encouraged to consider fundraisers that do not involve food and beverages.
- g. No candy, soda, or artificially flavored drinks that contain no pure juices will not be sold or given without charge to students during the school day with the following exception: Principals may give permission for candy to be given to students without charge after the end of the last lunch period for special events.
- 4. Foods of Minimal Nutritional Value and Candy

Foods of minimal nutritional value and all other candy will not be sold or given without charge to students during the school day with the following exception: Principals may give permission for candy to be given to students without charge after the end of the last lunch period for special events.

## E. Staff Health and Wellness

- 1. The HCPSS will provide opportunities for staff members to improve their health status through the HCPSS Commit To Be Fit Employee Wellness Program which includes activities such as health assessments, health education, and health-related fitness activities.
- 2. The HCPSS Commit To Be Fit Employee Wellness Program will be overseen by the Employee Wellness Council consisting of representatives from all employee groups.
- 3. All staff members are encouraged to model healthful eating and physical activity.

# V. Compliance Responsibilities

- A. The Superintendent/Designee will provide an annual report on the implementation of the policy.
- B. The Superintendent/Designee will ensure that any subsequent changes to this policy are reported to the MSDE.
- AC. The Superintendent/dDesignee shall will develop, implement and monitor a process for the development and review of the school system's HCPSS's curriculum and assessment programs that complies with state and local requirements and provides sufficient academic rigor for students.
- <u>BD</u>. The Superintendent/<u>dD</u>esignee is responsible for will provideing for annual notification of this policy and procedures to staff, students, parents, and the community.
- C. The school-based instructional staff and administrators are responsible for the delivery of the written curriculum in the classroom.
- DE. The Superintendent/dDesignee will ensure that opportunities for physical activity are provided during the school day in accordance with this policy.
- F. The Superintendent/dDesignee will ensure that any subsequent changes to this policy are reported to the Maryland State Department of Education (MSDE). oversee school implementation and compliance with this policy, including:
  - 1. Provide technical assistance and support to assist schools with implementation of the policy and improve programming functions.
  - 2. Ensure schools are offered support services through various departments including the Food and Nutrition Service, Physical Education, and Health and Physical Education, to ensure the full implementation of this policy.
  - 3. Establish a process for identifying and distributing resources made available by qualified agencies and community organizations for the purpose of collaborating with schools and community organizations such as Boosters and the PTA Council of Howard County (PTACHC) to enhance implementation of this policy.
  - 4. Establish a process to gather regular reporting and feedback from individual schools, community partners, students, and parents on the implementation of the policy.
  - 5. Conduct periodic evaluations and report on systemwide and individual schools' compliance with the policy.

- 6. Conduct periodic, systemwide review and assessment of this policy and other related Board policies on their effectiveness and, based on this assessment, propose policy revisions.
- G. Each school principal will ensure that a School Wellness Team is formed annually to spearhead health and wellness initiatives at the school that are in compliance with this policy. The principal will establish a system to annually identify School Wellness Team members which may include parents/guardians, teachers of physical education, classroom teachers, school nurses/assistants, students, school administrators, and community health and wellness partners.
- <u>H.</u> Each school principal will annually designate a school employee to serve as the School Wellness Champion who will:
  - 1. Lead and coordinate their school's efforts to increase healthy eating and physical activity for students.
  - 2. Serve as the liaison for their respecitive school's policy and reporting as needed.
  - 3. Establish and lead a School Wellness Team that develops goals, strategies, and initiatives for student health, wellness, and physical activity during the school year.
- <u>I.</u> Each school principal will provide annual updates to the Office of Health and Wellness regarding the school's health and wellness initiatives and the school's implementation of this policy.
- J. The Howard County School Health Council, which serves in an advisory capacity, will provide feedback annually to the Board.
- K. The HCPSS will report the number of schools that meet the HealthierUS Schools
   Challenge annually. Additional annual school progress measures may be developed to track progress on implementation of Coordinated School Health.
- EL. The Food and Nutrition Service Department Office and school principals will ensure that all foods and beverages made available to students in schools or through school-sponsored events, from 12:01 a.m. until the end of the school day, are in compliance with this policy.
- M. Professional development on the implementation of this policy will be provided as part of the regular professional development program for staff.

## VI. Delegation of Authority

The Superintendent is authorized to develop procedures for the implementation of this policy.

# I. Implementation Procedures Statement

Coordinated school health is a systematic approach to improving students' health and well-being so they can participate and succeed in school. Developing habits for healthy eating and regular physical activity can have a lifelong positive impact on students' health. A coordinated approach calls for the Board of Education, Superintendent, and staff to work together, engage families and communities, and commit to consistent modeling of healthy behaviors. Attention to the physical, social, emotional, and mental health of our student body involves the entire community, including students, parents, counselors, teachers, health professionals, community organizations, administrators, and more.

In order to successfully implement this policy, the Howard County Public School System (HCPSS) is committed to engaging and educating the community, staff, and students of the importance of health and well-being to academic achievement.

# **III.** Health and Nutrition Education

A Students in prekindergarten through\_ grade twelve 12 will receive nutrition health education that is interactive and teaches the skills they need to adopt healthy eating behaviors. Students will receive nutrition messages throughout the school that are consistent and reinforce each other. in multiple formats with opportunities to acquire the knowledge, attitudes, and skills necessary for making healthpromoting decisions, achieving health literacy, adopting health-enhancing behaviors, and promoting healthy lifestyles.

The Howard County Public School System will implement an Essential Health Education Curriculum which includes Nutrition Education for students in prekindergarten through grade nine.

B. The health education curriculum will include nutrition education for students in prekindergarten—grade 8 and in a required high school health education course.

Nutrition education will provide students with developmentally appropriate, culturally relevant, participatory activities to develop student understanding of the food system and to experience a variety of tastes.

- 1. At the elementary level, the <u>Hh</u>ealth <u>Ee</u>ducation curriculum will be taught by the classroom teacher as one of the five content areas in the <u>Ee</u>lementary <u>Curricular Pprogram</u>.
- 2. At the middle school level, the <u>Hh</u>ealth <u>Ee</u>ducation curriculum will be taught <u>every other day</u> for one <u>quarter (nine weeks) each during semester in grades six 6, seven 7, and eight 8.</u>
- 3. At the high school level, the <u>Hh</u>ealth <u>Ee</u>ducation curriculum will be taught for one semester (18 weeks) at <u>grade nine</u> to meet high school graduation requirements.
- 4. Nutrition education will develop student understanding of the food system and aide students in experiencing different tastes through programs such as: school gardens, visiting local farms, Days of Taste or similar programs, Department of Agriculture Robinson Nature Center, community college curriculum, and others.
- 5. The cafeteria will be utilized as a learning environment to reinforce nutrition education.

#### B. Elective Courses

<u>C.</u> Nutrition education will be included in the essential objectives in appropriate elective courses in such as Family and Consumer Sciences, Health Education, and Physical Education.

# C. Content Integration

<u>D.</u> Staff will be encouraged to teach nutrition education through content integration in curricular areas such as science, mathematics, and social studies. <u>HCPSS will provide resources to all teachers on how to integrate nutrition education into the curriculum.</u>

#### D. Related Programs

- E. Staff will be encouraged to collaborate with other programs and offices such as the Gifted and Talented Program, Health Services, and Student Services in to delivering nutrition education through classroom, small group, and individual activities.
- F. Nutrition information and resources will be provided to families through newsletters, publications, health fairs, the HCPSS website, and other means.

# **HIII.** Physical Education and Physical Activity

### A. Physical Education

1. Students at all grade levels will have access to the physical education curriculum which includes opportunities to learn, meaningful content, and appropriate instruction.

### A. Essential Curriculum

The Howard County Public School System will implement an Essential Pphysical Eeducation Ccurriculum for students in prekindergarten through \_ grade nine8.

### B. Quality of Instruction

The Physical Education curriculum will be taught by a physical education specialist at all levels.

- 4<u>a</u>. <u>The Eelementary school students master schedule</u> will receive four quarters (36 weeks) reflect 90 minutes of physical education instruction per year week.
- 2. Middle school students will receive a minimum of two quarters (18 weeks) of instruction in sixth grade and a minimum of one quarter (9 weeks) of instruction in both seventh and eighth grades.
  - b. The middle school master schedule will reflect 50 minutes of physical education every other day.
- 3. At the high school level <u>In grades 9–12</u>, students will receive one-semester (18 weeks) <u>half credit</u> of physical education-instruction, at grade nine in the Lifetime Fitness course, to meet graduation requirements. In addition, <u>HCPSS</u> will offer a variety of physical education electives.

#### C. Elective Courses

At the high school level, students will be able to select from a variety of Physical Education and Dance courses. Dance education electives will be offered as a fine arts credit or physical education elective.

### D. Content Integration

Staff will be encouraged to teach physical education through content integration in all curricular areas and appropriate programs:

4. <u>Physical education staff will receive professional development on an ongoing basis.</u>

### <u>HIB</u>. Physical Activity

With the goal of limiting extended periods of inactivity and Tto promote learning, staff will receive resources, guidance, and professional development on ways to incorporate physical activity within the school day with the goal of limiting extended periods of inactivity. In addition, schools will adhere to the following guidelines:

### A. Elementary School

#### 1. Recess

- 4<u>a</u>. Each elementary school will provide daily recess, preferably outdoors, during which schools should encourage moderate to vigorous physical activity through the provision of adequate space and equipment. Exceptions may be made by the principal for circumstances such as shortened days, special events, and altered schedules.
- 2b. Recess must be <u>adequately and appropriately staffed and</u> supervised. Appropriate equipment and space is to be made available so that students can be physically active and safe.
- c. At the middle school level, time permitting, schools will provide students with an opportunity for supervised physical activity.
- d. The Superintendent/Designee will establish recess guidelines.

### 2. Other Physical Activity During School

- 3. <u>a. All staff</u> will be encouraged to limit using recess as a time for students to make up work or as a time to administer discipline incorporate physical activity breaks whenever possible into classroom instruction.
  - <u>b.</u> HCPSS will provide training that encourages physical activity to aid teachers in implementing physical activity breaks.
  - c. School Wellness Teams will proactively communicate with parents/guardians about the importance of physical activity.

#### B. Middle School

3. Extracurricular and Intramural Programs

- <u>+a</u>. Each <u>middle</u> school will provide an intramural program that offers students an opportunity to participate in sports, games, and/or dance activities <u>that focus on cardiovascular fitness, muscular strength, endurance and flexibility</u>.
- 2. Time permitting, schools should provide students with an opportunity for supervised physical activity during their lunch period.

## C. High School

<u>b.</u> Each <u>high</u> school will provide a comprehensive interscholastic athletic program under the Standards of Policy 9080 Interscholastic Athletic <u>Program</u>. Competition according to COMAR 13A.06.03.04. Refer to Policy 9080, Interscholastic Athletic Activities.

## IV. Facilities and Equipment

- A. When schools are built or renovated, the design of gymnasium facilities will consider the Physical Education Facilities Guidelines issued by the Maryland State Department of Education (MSDE).
- B. The HCPSS will review its permitting and actual space usage each year to ensure maximum use of school facilities during and after school for in accordance with Policy 10020 Use of School Facilities.

### **IV.** Nutrition Services; Foods and Beverages

- A. General Provisions
- 1. These procedures apply to all foods and beverages made available to students in schools during the school day on HCPSS property, or through school-sponsored events, including but not limited to the following means:
  - a. School Meals Program
  - b. A la carte <u>and snack/dessert</u> items
  - e. Vending machines
  - d. Classroom lessons
  - e. Beverage contracts
  - f. Fundraisers
  - g. Concession stands
  - h. . . School stores

- i. Food brought from home for classes or groups of students
- j.\_•. Student rewards
- k. School parties/ celebrations/ dances/ athletic events/ concerts/ picnics/ field days/ fairs/ festivals, etc.
  - •. Resource speakers
- 2. Foods and beverages covered by this policy shall also will comply with the current United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) Dietary Guidelines for Americans and federal, state, and local laws, including safety and sanitation standards set by the Health Department Hazard Analysis and Critical Control Point (HACCP) plans and guidelines.
  - 3. No foods or beverages are to be sold or given without charge to any students in a school from 12:01 am until after the end of the last lunch period except through the School Food and Nutrition Service Department.
  - 4. The preparation of foods and beverages during the school day by any group or organization other than the School Food and Nutrition Service Department is prohibited, except that students may prepare foods and beverages in accordance with the provisions of section IV.C.4 of these procedures.
  - <u>CA</u>. Safety and Security Issues Related to Foods and Beverages

To help ensure the health and safety of the students in our schools the following procedures will be implemented:

- 1. Howard County Health Department Regulations (referenced via the Howard County Code) require that food served to the public must be prepared in a licensed facility. The license for the <u>HCPSS</u> School Food and Nutrition Service <del>Department</del> is not transferable to outside caterers or groups applying for use of the facilities.
- 2. For the safety and security of the food and facility, access to the food service facilities is limited to <u>HCPSS</u> Food and Nutrition Service staff.
- 3. Breads, cakes, cookies and brownies prepared in private homes and unlicensed facilities are allowed as long as they are not the cream filled type. See also section IV.D.1.b. of these procedures. The preparation of foods and beverages during the school day by any group or organization other than the HCPSS School Food and Nutrition Service office is prohibited, except that students may prepare foods and beverages in accordance with the provisions of section V.A.4. of these procedures.

- 4. Classroom activities that involve cooking are not permitted, except as defined in the curriculum for Family and Consumer Science, Academic Life Skills (ALS), and when indicated in a student's IEP, and are limited to non-hazardous foods. Examples of potentially hazardous foods that are excluded from classroom activities include foods made with poultry, meats, fish, rice, eggs, seafood, mayonnaise, dairy products, casseroles, and sauces containing meat.
- 5. Schools will provide students the opportunity to wash their hands before and after eating meals or snacks.
- 6. Principals and teachers should will request that parents and other individuals avoid bringing foods to elass school that might cause the individual a food allergic student to have an allergic reaction. (See the HCPSS Guidelines for Management of Students with Severe Food Allergies.)
- 7. Except as provided in sections V.A.4. and V.E.2., no foods or beverages are to be sold or given without charge to any students in a school from 12:01 a.m. until after the end of the last lunch period except through the School Food and Nutrition Service.

#### B. Student Rewards

Foods and beverages will not be given as a reward to students or withheld as a punishment, except as provided in a student's Individualized Educational Program (IEP) or 504 Plan. Coupons for food items that are to be consumed off school campus may be given. Outside partners providing coupons are encouraged to offer healthier, nutrient-dense choices (i.e. those that include fruits and vegetables, whole grains, and/or low-fat dairy and foods that limit the sodium, fat, sugar and calories per serving). Informational resources on HCPSS' nutritional guidelines will be provided to external partners.

### BC. School Meals Program

The School Food and Nutrition Service Department is required to provide approved school lunches each day that school is in session. School meals shall meet nutrition standards established by the USDA. Students must be given adequate time (30 minutes) to eat. Lunch periods may be compressed on shortened days.

#### 1. Foods

- a. Main course food items offered in elementary, middle, and high schools as an alternative to or in addition to the reimbursable meal will be offered in reasonable portion sizes that are consistent with guidance provided by the USDA for Child Nutrition Programs.
- b. Packaged a la carte foods will meet the guidelines from MSDE.

- 1. The School Food and Nutrition Service will provide approved school lunches each day that school is in session.
- 2. School meals will meet all nutrition standards established by the USDA.
- 3. Daily food choices offered to students will include multiple entrees, fresh unlimited salad bars, trays of fruits and vegetables, whole grain breads and rolls, and flavored and unflavored fat-free or 1% milk. Although students are free to choose the foods they want for lunch, at least one of their choices will be a fruit or vegetable.
- 4. Main course food items offered as alternatives to or in addition to the reimbursable meal will be offered in reasonable portion sizes that are consistent with the USDA for Child Nutrition Programs.
- 5. The School Breakfast Program will be available to all students every weekday morning that school is in session. Exceptions may be made by the school principal on delayed opening days. No advance registration is necessary, students can attend every day or only occasionally, and the meals will be based on the nutrition recommendations set forth in the USDA Dietary Guidelines. The School Breakfast Program models include but are not limited to: Traditional Breakfast, Breakfast in the Classroom, Grab and Go Breakfast, and/or Breakfast after First Period.
- 6. Morning bus routes will be scheduled to allow students to arrive in time for breakfast.
- 7. The HCPSS will proactively promote the school breakfast program to students and parents to encourage greater participation.
- 8. Students are prohibited from leaving the school campus for lunch.
- 9. Students will be given adequate time to eat. Lunch periods may be compressed and the breakfast program may be skipped on shortened days.
- 10. The School Food and Nutrition Service will incorporate produce from local farms as much as possible and when in season and available.
- 11. Schools will make nutritional information available to students to make informed decisions. Healthier choices, such as salads and fruit, will be prominently displayed in cafeterias and competitively priced.
- 12. Students will be provided a pleasant environment in which to eat school meals. Appropriate supervision will be provided in the cafeteria and rules for safe behavior will be consistently enforced.

- 13. Professional development in the area of food and nutrition will be provided annually for food service managers, staff, and school administrators.
- 14. The school system will provide periodic food promotions at each school level to encourage taste testing of healthy new foods being introduced on the menu.
- 15. Students and families will have the opportunity to provide input on local, cultural and ethnic favorites, and the input will be considered in development of the school meals programs.

## <u>2D</u>. Beverages

The sale of beverages in school cafeterias during the school day is limited to the following:

- a. Water
- b. Flavored water
- c. Flavored and unflavored milk
- d. 100% fruit/vegetable juice
- e. Fruit/vegetable juice beverages with at least 10% fruit/vegetable juice and 100% vitamin C
- 1. <u>All beverages given or sold to students on school campus, with the exception of concessions, including beverages sold in vending machines that are accessible to students, must meet the HCPSS Nutritional Guidelines.</u>
- 2. Students will have access to drinking water that is safe and clean throughout the school day, and free of charge in the school cafeteria, classrooms, hallways, gymnasiums, play yards, and athletic fields.
- 3. The Superintendent/Designee will set and maintain hygiene standards for drinking fountains, water coolers, hydration stations, water jets, and other methods of delivering drinking water.
- 4. Students may purchase unflavored, unfortified, non-carbonated water from vending machines operated by the Food and Nutrition Service during the school day.
- D. School Activities Involving Foods and Beverages
  - 1. Activities involving food not prohibited within these procedures are allowable as follows:
    - a. Foods prepared commercially in licensed facilities such as pizza, ice cream, and snacks are allowable after the end of the last lunch period.

- b. Foods prepared in private homes or unlicensed facilities are allowable after the end of the last lunch period. They must adhere to the provisions in section IV.C.3 of these procedures.
- e. Schools are encouraged to limit activities involving food allowable after the end of the last lunch period to once a month.
- 2. Schools are encouraged to consider wellness issues and student allergies when planning incentive and promotional activities and to promote healthy food and beverage choices at all events where foods and beverages are available to students.

## E. Other Foods and Beverages

- 1. A la carte and snack/dessert items sold by the Food and Nutrition Service will meet the guidelines from MSDE and the Institute of Medicine Standards for Competitive Foods.
- 32. With the approval of the Assistant Superintendent for School Administration, aA principal may provide permit food and/or beverages in conjunction with a special celebration for a portion of the students provided the event does no more than once per month after the end of the last lunch period. Such events may not replace the food service provided that day by the School Food and Nutrition Service Department. The food and beverages served will be prepared commercially in licensed facilities and will comply with HCPSS Nutritional Guidelines established by the Superintendent/Designee.
- 4. Schools are encouraged to develop alternatives to the use of food for celebrations or as rewards.
- 5. Foods and beverages should not be consumed as an educational tool except as defined in the curriculum for Family and Consumer Science, Academic Life Skills (ALS), and when indicated in a student's IEP.
- 6. Foods and beverages should not be offered as a reward or withheld as punishment.
- 3. Foods and beverages sold via concessions must follow HCPSS Nutritional Guidelines and must include some healthier items (such as fruits and vegetables, whole grains, low-fat dairy and items that limit salt, sugar and saturated fat). The Superintendent/Designee will provide user-friendly guidelines (such as sample menus) and provide educational resources to assist groups in developing healthier menu options.
- 4. All foods and beverages sold in vending machines that are accessible to students will meet the HCPSS Nutritional Guidelines.
- 7. Groups sponsoring special events held during the school day (such as picnics, field days, parties, fairs, and festivals) must adhere to this policy, and must

- consult with the School Food and Nutrition Service Department for guidance when planning such events.
- 5. All other food and beverages sold or provided free of charge on school system property where the primary customers or recipients are students will comply with the HCPSS Nutritional Guidelines. This includes foods/snacks sold or provided during field days, fairs, after school events, bake sales, spaghetti dinners, etc. Groups sponsoring these activities will consult with the School Food and Nutrition Service for guidance when planning such events.
- 6. Food fundraisers that involve consumption of food off school campus are encouraged to offer healthier food options (such as fruits and vegetables, whole grains, low-fat dairy and items that limit salt, sugar and saturated fat). The Superintendent/Designee will provide educational resources to organizations and clubs to encourage expansion of healthier food fundraisers or fundraisers that do not involve food.
- 7. Partnerships with external businesses that provide coupons or promotions for consumption of food off school campus are encouraged to offer healthier food options (such as fruits and vegetables, whole grains, low-fat dairy and items that limit salt, sugar and saturated fat). The Superintendent/Designee will proactively communicate with potential and current partners to promote healthier options and non-food rewards for students.

### F. Prohibited Foods and Beverages

- <u>8.</u> The following items will not be sold or given without charge to students during the school day:
- 1. Foods of minimal nutritional value:
  - i. Hard candy
  - ii. Jellies and gums
  - iii. Marshmallow candies
  - iv. Fondant (a soft candy made of or containing a thick creamy sugar paste and usually molded)
  - v. Licorice
  - vi. Spun candy
  - vii. Candy coated popcorn
  - a. Soda with sugar or artificially flavored drinks that contain no pure juices.
  - b. Water ices.
  - c. Chewing gum.
  - d. Certain candies Candy.
- 2. All other candy. However, principals may make exceptions and allow candy which is not on the list of foods of minimal nutritional value to be given to

students without charge after the end of the last lunch period for special events. See section IV.D for further guidelines.

#### E. Water

Students must have access to water throughout the school day. This may include access to water fountains, permission to carry water in clear containers, and opportunities to purchase water from vending machines operated by the School Food and Nutrition Service Department. Vending machines that sell only water are permitted to operate during the school day.

- GF. Vending Machines Accessible After the School Day
  - 1. Access
  - 1. All vending machines <u>accessible to students</u>, except those operated by the School Food and Nutrition Service <del>Department</del>, shall <u>will</u> have and use a timing device to automatically prohibit access to the vending machines from 12:01 am <u>a.m.</u> until the end of the school day.
  - 2. <u>Beverages Food and Bb</u>everages sold after the end of the school day through vending machines in schools shall be limited to: are permitted only at the middle and high school level.
    - a. Water
    - b. Flavored water
    - c. Flavored and unflavored milk
    - d. 100% fruit/vegetable juice
    - e. Fruit/vegetable juice beverages with at least 10% fruit/vegetable juice and 100% vitamin C
    - f. Iced tea, isotonic beverages (i.e., sports drinks), and sodas may be offered only at the secondary level and may constitute no more than 50% of the vending machines selections.

### VI. District-Level Implementation

The Superintendent/Designee oversee school implementation and compliance with this policy including:

- A. Provide technical assistance and support to assist schools with implementation of the policy and improve programming functions.
- B. Ensure schools are offered support services through various departments including the Food and Nutrition Service, Physical Education, and Health and Physical Education, to ensure the full implementation of this policy.

- C. Establish a process for identifying and distributing resources made available by qualified agencies and community organizations for the purpose of collaborating with schools and community organizations such as Boosters and the PTA Council of Howard County (PTACHC) to enhance implementation of this policy.
- <u>D.</u> <u>Establish a process to gather regular reporting and feedback from individual</u> <u>schools, community partners, students, and parents on the implementation of the policy.</u>
- E. Conduct periodic evaluations and report on systemwide and individual schools' compliance with the policy.
- <u>F.</u> Conduct periodic, systemwide review and assessment of this policy and other related Board policies on their effectiveness and, based on this assessment, propose policy revisions.

# **VII.** School-Level Implementation

- A. Each school principal will ensure that a School Wellness Team is formed annually to spearhead health and wellness initiatives at the school that are in compliance with this policy. The principal will establish a system to annually identify School Wellness Team members which may include parents/guardians, teachers of physical education, classroom teachers, school nurses/assistants, students, school administrators, and community health and wellness partners.
- B. Each school principal will annually designate a school employee to serve as the School Wellness Champion who will:
  - 1. Lead and coordinate their school's efforts to increase healthy eating and physical activity for students.
  - 2. Serve as the liaison for their respective school's policy implementation and reporting.
  - 3. Establish and lead a School Wellness Team that develops goals, strategies, and initiatives for student health, wellness, and physical activity during the school year.
- C. Each school principal will provide annual updates to the Superintendent/Designee regarding the school's health and wellness initiatives and the school's implementation of this policy.

#### **VIII.** Staff Health and Wellness

A. The Employee Wellness Council will review the program philosophy, vision, mission, goals, and objectives of the HCPSS Commit To Be Fit Employee Wellness Program, evaluate the needs of the school system, recommend specific

- programs, determine needed resources, and establish evaluation outcome measures. In partnership with the Wellness Coordinator, Employee Wellness Council members will act as champions of wellness by promoting participation of all employees in healthy lifestyle activities.
- B. The Employee Wellness Council will support the goal of the HCPSS Commit To Be Fit Employees Wellness Program, which is to provide opportunities, support, and encouragement for employees to seek healthy lifestyle choices that enhance physical, emotional, mental, social, and spiritual well-being.
- C. The Employee Wellness Council members will represent a variety of school district departments. The Employee Wellness Council will also act on behalf of those departments not represented and will seek input from those departments through regular communication. All departments will have an opportunity to have representation on the council as members are rotated off and are replaced biannually.
- <u>D.</u> The Employee Wellness Council will present an annual report to the Board to include information such as program highlights, details of activities conducted, participation data, future plans, measures of results, and return on investment data.

# **YIX.** Family/Community Collaboration

- A. The Howard-County Public School System will partner with the Howard County School Health Council (COMAR 13A.05.05) and other agencies to support the practice implementation of healthy eating, nutrition education, and physical activity in the school environment. coordinated and comprehensive school health practices.
- B. Parents and members of the community have the opportunity to be involved in implementation of this policy through:
  - 1. Howard County School Health Council: Parents and members of the community may serve on the School Health Council and/or its subcommittee.
  - 2. School Wellness Teams: Parents and community health and wellness partners will be invited to participate in school-level School Wellness Teams.
  - 3. Boosters and PTA Council of Howard County (PTACHC): This office will work with schools and community organizations such as the Boosters and PTACHC.
- <u>C.</u> Parents will receive educational resources and encouragement to help their children implement physical activity plans.

D. Families will be engaged in school activities that encourage healthy eating, and will have opportunities for input in the menus and other aspects of school nutrition.
